Trade through Texas supports an estimated **1.6 MILLION TEXAS JOBS** and adds **\$224.3 BILLION** to GSP annually.



ABOUT PORT OF HOUSTON

THE PORT OF HOUSTON IS THE NATION'S BUSIEST PORT FOR FOREIGN WATERBORNE CARGO. OVERALL THE PORT HANDLED A TOTAL OF 234.3 MILLION TONS IN 2015. THE PORT HOUSES MORE THAN 150 INDUSTRIAL COMPANIES. MORE THAN 56,000 EMPLOYEES WORK IN OPERATIONS RELATED TO MOVING CARGO THROUGH THE PORT.



The Port of Houston is the largest of the 10 seaports along Texas' 367-mile Gulf of Mexico coastline. The Houston Ship Channel was officially opened in 1914, and today this 52-mile-long waterway is the busiest in the U.S.

- A 25-mile-long complex of diversified public and private facilities
- A shipping channel 45 feet deep and 530 feet wide



ROOM TO GROW

Between 2012 and 2016, the Port of Houston and the surrounding industries it supports received an estimated \$35 billion in private investment. Magellan Midstream currently plans to construct a \$335 million marine terminal. In addition, the Port of Houston

Authority has invested \$50 million for four super post-Panamax cranes, each nearly 30 stories tall, and committed \$1.6 billion during the next five years to expand container terminals at Barbours Cut and Bayport and deepen their channels to 45 feet.

SINCE 2011, THE PORT OF HOUSTON HAS SEEN A SHIFT FROM LIQUID BULK CARGO TO MORE LABOR-INTENSIVE CONTAINERIZED CARGO AND STEEL, RESULTING IN A NET INCREASE IN DIRECT EMPLOYMENT.


SPOTLIGHT: PORT OF HOUSTON AUTHORITY

The Port of Houston Authority, created by the Texas Legislature in 1927, oversees and manages the Port of Houston and the Houston Ship Channel. The Port Authority also owns and maintains the public terminals within the Port of Houston, including the nation's largest break-bulk terminal (that is, for cargo that must be loaded individually), as well as


HOUSTON-GALVESTON CUSTOMS DISTRICT
