
LAREDO

Texas' location and diverse economy offer unique trade opportunities and make it a critical gateway to global business. Our state boasts **29 OFFICIAL PORTS** of entry facilitating more than **\$631 BILLION** in trade in 2015. Trade through Texas supports an estimated **1.6 MILLION TEXAS JOBS** and adds **\$224.3 BILLION** to GSP annually.

Ports of entry play a crucial role in making Texas the world's **10TH LARGEST ECONOMY**. They affect every part of our state, from our largest cities to rural counties. As the state's chief financial officer, I hope highlighting their benefits will emphasize their importance to strong, diverse and growing regional economies.

ABOUT LAREDO

Laredo's five border crossings accounted for **\$204 BILLION** – 32 percent – of all international trade in Texas in 2015. They represent the largest commercial crossing from Mexico into Texas, as trains, commercial trucks and even pedestrians transport goods across its bridges.

Our analysis found that Laredo's inland port creates some **363,000** net Texas jobs and contributes **\$52 BILLION** to the state's gross domestic product.






Laredo's border crossings include five bridges

between the U.S. and Mexico. Four of these are city-owned vehicular bridges. The fifth is a railroad bridge owned and operated by Kansas City Southern Railway Company, though the city controls southbound operations, employing 182 people and collecting \$60 million in tolls. In addition to bridge employees, the U.S. Customs and Border Patrol employs 1,950 customs field officers and 1,770 Border Patrol agents.

LAREDO BORDER CROSSING ACTIVITY

Nearly 11 million pedestrians, cars and trucks crossed into Laredo from Mexico in 2015. Northbound truck traffic jumped by 27.1 percent from 2010 to 2015, while traffic from other vehicles rose by 8.2 percent and pedestrian traffic fell by 2 percent.



2014-2015:





LAREDO CUSTOMS DISTRICT

Laredo border crossings are part of the larger Laredo Customs District. The district accounted for \$284 billion in trade in 2015, making it the third-largest U.S. customs district by value, behind Los Angeles and New York.
